The IQAC takes special interest in the implementation of new programmes initiated by the Directorate of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala such as the Walk With the Scholar, Scholar Support Programme and Additional Skill Acquisition Programme. Under the supervision of IQAC, the college publishes a handbook annually for the teachers and students of the college. An orientation programme is conducted for the newly admitted students at the college level and the department levels at the beginning of every year. This helps to create awareness among them about the need for completing the course and thereby decreasing the chance of drop outs. Students are given academic support and encouragement to take part in quiz competitions, debates, literary competitions, exhibitions, poster competitions, etc. Information regarding the various competitions is conveyed over the public address system and details are put up on the notice board. In addition to this the IQAC documents various programmes and activities of the institution for enabling future reference and improving the teaching learning process. Data available are further analyzed to highlight areas requiring further follow up.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Curriculum is planned by the University.
- The college implements it in strict accordance with the existing rules and norms.
- The faculty of the college actively participates in Board of Studies of the University of Kerala

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The teaching and learning process effectively functions in such a way that information is passed to students in conventional ways and by using ICT enabled platforms. Teachers resort to the use of internet, e- books, e-journals, reference material, smart classrooms, ICT enabled language labs, ICT enabled practical classes, ICT enabled teaching, debates, field work and study tours. Students are provided exposure in reputed laboratories by arranging visits. Similarly, classes handled by experts are provided through EDUSAT facility available in the college. Promotion of credit based co-curricular and extracurricular activities are achieved through the various clubs functioning in the college. Students are exposed to emerging areas by arranging seminars/workshops and invited talks. Teacher appraisals are done by the students at the end of the odd semester and the feedbacks are provided to the teachers concerned. Merit awards for students, who excel in academics, are organized by the college PTA.

2. Goal

The vision of the college is to mould the students of this institution into well-meaning citizens of our nation through a socially committed, intellectually inclined, culture driven and future oriented paradigm of learning. Our vision is also empower the students to aspire for significantly contributing to the nation through socialist and secular strategies of instruction.

The college will strive to stride forward and keep pace with the changing needs and spirits of the times. It will continue to foster talent and build on its rich repository of fame and prestige. The college will continue to uphold its commitment to the nation in general and to the society in particular and will strive to carry this out through a series of carefully crafted, scientifically tested and systematically executed steps of action. The college will spread and increase its academic potential by providing conducive academic ambience for all classes of students and teachers. It will give importance to learning from the past, assimilating the present and planning for the future.

We aim at educating and bringing out the best in every single student who enters the portals of this college so that each of them is well equipped both for life and for a living. Our mode of education is to mould an individual into a good human being and we have taken efforts to cultivate personal skills needed for a good life. This is well exemplified by the programmes such as ASAP, Walk with Scholar, NSS, NCC and Civil Services Coaching. The Career Guidance Cell by its activities aims at shaping and moulding the students for facing life both in the academic as well as professional fields. Activities of the Placement cell promote the students to come forward and get placements in reputed institutions and organizations so that the students get a safe platform to come up in their life. The college authorities have well planned schemes for looking into the needs and skills of students of schools and the society as a whole. The Scholar Support Programme, Scheme of Promotion of Excellence Gifted Students of Kerala and Service to Society through NSS are the activities that promote such well-being in the society. In addition to class room teaching, we take special interest in nurturing the various skills of our students as well as other students of nearby schools and colleges and also the needs of the society.

3. The Context:

About 1000 new students join this college every year for the PG and UG courses and M.Phil. course, offered by the college in about 23 disciplines. Even though the college is situated at the heart of

the city, most of the students come from rural areas, and that too from poor economic background. Besides class-room teaching, we organize a wide range of activities and programmes for developing the soft skills, life skills, and entrepreneurial skills, artistic and academic talents of the students. The motto of service to society is embedded in the minds and activities of each individual teacher and concerned authorities of the college and therefore we have well planned activities through the NSS for serving the society. The physical skills of the students are nurtured by the activities of the Physical Education department. By giving coaching to IAS aspirants we try to focus not only our students but outside students also who aim at serving the society. A sense of respect, pride and dedication to our nation is inculcated in the minds of students who take part in the NCC activities.

4. The Practice:

The college authorities convene a meeting for the students who get enrolled in this college especially the UG students are given an awareness of the tradition and history of the college as well as the various courses and open courses that are offered by the various departments, and also the rules and regulations to be observed in the campus. They are also made aware of the different clubs functioning in the campus along with their objectives. Students can join any one of these clubs according to their interest and choice and improve themselves by actively participating in it. The students are also informed about the functioning of bodies like Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell and Counseling Centre which provide protection and support to the students.

The students are encouraged to join the various club activities that are organized college wise as well as department wise, such as Nature club, Science club, Women's club, Literary club, Drama club, Film club, Geoforum, etc. and these activities imbibe in the students a sense of responsibility and well being and aspire them for coming up in life. These activities are taken up as a collaborative work of the college as a whole or individual departments. The Geoforum meetings conducted every Friday during the afternoon break session by the Department of Geology help the students to remove their stage fear and speak boldly in front of large audiences as well as to prepare themselves for the latest developments in the scientific, literary and economic fields, especially the field of earth sciences. The contributions of the other clubs are also worth mentioning, helping the students in one way or other in addition to their actual study of course materials.

The Department of Physical Education provides training to the students in sports and games, and renders the students fit to take part in various university level, state level as well as national level sports and games events. The Department organized coaching camps in the campus and sent the players to participate in the coaching camps conducted by Kerala University and Kerala Sports Council.

Students who prefer a career as Civil servants are given excellent coaching in the Civil Services Coaching Centre run by the college. Both students from the college as well as outside get the benefit from the coaching centre. Walk with a scholar Programme enrolled new students in the academic programme for the year, and were selected according to the guidelines. New internal mentors were nominated by the College Council from among those who expressed their willingness to join the programme. Mentors who had joined the programme in the previous year continued to be in the programme this year also. All Internal mentors attended the training programme conducted by the OSD. External mentorship programmes had to be conducted exclusively on Saturdays the match the availability of mentors and the convenience of the mentees as well as to achieve sufficient contact hours for interaction, without losing normal teaching hours. External mentorship programmes had to be arranged as class room sessions due to the reluctance on the part of both mentors and mentees to fix up convenient times and schedules for interaction outside the college. Such classes were deeply appreciated by the mentees and did have the advantage of reaching more mentees than the actual allotted number. Classes on public speaking, creative writing in English and Malayalam, accelerated learning techniques,

personality development, computer soft skills, disaster management, career prospects in the defense services, entrepreneurship development in biotechnology (mushroom culture, organic farming, hi-tech farming) etc were arranged. As part of the programme, study cum motivational tour was arranged to important places in addition to an educational tour programme. The Scholar support Programme is actively involved in upbringing the talents and aptitudes of brilliant students as well as the aspiring students of the college.

In coordination with ASAP – Additional Skill Acquisition Programme, which is a joint initiative of General Education Department and Higher Education Department, Government of Kerala, selected students of the college are given training and guidance for equipping them with skills in cutting edge sectors in order to effectively help them in acquiring jobs of their interest. The program of Promotion of Excellence among Gifted Students is meant for children of grades VIIIth and IXth standard. The program uses a hands-on approach integrating mathematics, science (Physics, Chemistry & Biology), English, information technology and counseling in all the districts in Kerala. The program is consistent with the international recommendations in Science Curriculum and Evaluation Standards for School students. The model of learning includes interaction with the real world through hands-on activities; design, construction, and use of data records; use of graphic/pictorial representations to display data; and engagement in the higher-order thinking processes of hypothesizing, inferring, and generalizing. The students participating the programme belong to various schools of sub districts Trivandrum, Neyyatinkara and Attingal. The programme was monitored by Deputy Director of Education, Trivandrum. There are 60 students in each batch. i.e. 60 from VIIIth standard as fresh and they will continue till in IXth standard. So there will be a total of 120 students at a time. Classes are arranged separate for seniors and juniors. The students are also getting chances to present their scientific data in Seminars including National Children’s Science Congress and Initiative for Research and Innovation in Science (IRIS). The classes are arranged on two Saturdays month (Second and fourth Saturdays).

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College organized placement interviews by various firms for the students of the college. The National Service Scheme Unit of the college has four units in the College and has a total capacity of 400 volunteers. It conducted various activities including campus cleaning activities both within the campus as well as outside campus. Student volunteers were deputed to various camps conducted by the University of Kerala and also for the National Camps. The Army and Navy wings of the NCC unit of the college also conducted co-curricular programmes for the benefits of the candidates who got enrolled in the units. The cadets of Naval Wing attended and participated in National Integration Camps, Trekking Camps, Advanced Leadership Camps, Ship Attachment Camps, Sailing Expedition Camps and Annual Training Programmes. The total strength of the cadets for the year was 160 and the period of training was 2 years.

Walk with a Scholar Programme: A study cum motivational tour was arranged to the historically important places in and around Kozhikode, Vadakara, to acquaint the mentees with the rich heritage and history of Kerala. An inspiring and motivational visit to the Indian Institute of Management, Kozhikode with interaction between the faculties was arranged. A highly motivating talk on the career prospects in management highlighting the need for and career prospects of managers in all sections of administration and life was also arranged at the venue. They were taken on a guided tour of the museum, and the campus of the IIM-K, which was highly informative and well appreciated. The visit to the IIM-K museum was extremely educative as the exhibits were arranged on themes based on the historically important trades and trade-relationships between Kerala and other nations following on with the history of Indian trade and economy.

The mentees were also taken to an educational tour to the Science and Technology Museum at Kozhikode, before proceeding to Vadakara, Lokanarkavu, Heritage Village, Kolaba Turtle Conservation Centre, sand banks, Madapally College etc.

A tour to the Koodankulam Nuclear Power project was also made possible through the offices of the Kerala State Science and technology museum, where the mentees were able to get a once in a life time chance of seeing the dummy fuels being loaded into the reactor

5. Evidence of Success:

The various activities of the college mentioned above have provided success to number of students who have been active participants. The success of these activities of the college is reflected in the number of students who have been well placed in firms or were able to chalk out a higher academic career in other universities and colleges. In the ICICI Prudential campus placement held on 26-02-2014, 59 students participated of which 4 got selected. In NCC 10 cadets passed the 'B' examination and 43 cadets passed the 'C' examination. Cadets conducted special parades during the Independence and Republic Days, apart from normal parades of the year. Cadet Nandhu D. S. participated in the Snow Skiing Camp held at Kashmir. Two cadets Mohammad Safin and Fasela participated in the Republic day parade held at New Delhi. A guard of honour was given to the education minister at Nishagandhi Auditorium, Trivandrum on February 5, 2014. 40 cadets of this college have volunteered their service for Kerala University Kalolsavam held from 12-14 March, 2014. Under officers Kishore V. A. and Henna Kalidh were selected as best cadets of the year 2013-14. 30 cadets had participated in sports and tourism programme held at Shangumukam Beach in Trivandrum. One of our cadets named Aravind M. S. has joined the O7A during the year 2013-14. 130 cadets of University College have participated in a rally held in connection with World AIDS Day observation on December 1, 2014. 10. Our cadet Aravind M. S. had cleared staff selection board exam for JES. Our cadet Aswani R. participated in combined annual training camp held at Peringamala in Trivandrum from 27th September 2013 to 6th October 2013. She also participated in pre-RDC II held at Pallipuram CRPF camp from 21 November 2013 to 30 November 2013. SW cadet participated in Nilgiri National Girls Trekking Camp in the year 2013.

Our cadets have planted 100 plantains as part of the improvement of agriculture.

In the Walk with a Scholar Programme, Mr. Amalnath of 2nd year B.A. Economics was deputed to the state camp hosted by the OSD at Thiruvananthapuram. Ms. Ashna Salim and Adithya V.S. of 1st year B.A. Economics were sent to the meeting jointly hosted by the SEBI and Technopark at the newly emerging Technocity Campus, Pallipuram. 23 mentees attended a career oriented programme on computer aided designing conducted by Intercad systems co-hosted by the YMCA and IIPM, Thiruvananthapuram chapter at the YMCA. 20 mentees attended the leadership programme headed by Dr. Idiculla, Associate Professor, Harvard Medical School sponsored by the YMCA.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- (i) One of the major limitations faced by the college is space constraint. We have 10 Acres 60.270 cents of land in the heart of the city, but the existing buildings in the campus are crowded and sprawled which obstructs further construction. Lack of more number of additional classrooms causes inconveniences especially during the onset of University examinations as class rooms have to be converted to examination halls. The sanitation facilities for both teachers and students have to be improved to a great extent. Resources for the construction of multi-storeyed buildings are required for further developments and expansion.
- (ii) The number of posts of attenders, peons, sweepers and sanitation workers are not sufficient to

cater to the needs of the college and students.

(iii) Due to very tight academic schedule, the staffs find it very difficult to compensate for the lost working days.

SWOT Analysis of the College

STRENGTHS:

The Government College for Women is located at Vazhuthacaud, which is within 2 kms from the Central Railway and bus stations. The various programmes offered by the Institution are accommodated in permanent structures spread across 10.65 acres of lush greenery. Around 15 percent of the buildings fall under the heritage and archeologically protected areas. Although the College is located in an urban area, 90 percent of the students are from the rural areas and belong to socially and economically backward segments. The college is accredited with 'A' grade by the NAAC in 2005. On comparison, our college stands out as the most preferred destination for the academically excellent students among similar Arts and Science Colleges functioning within Kerala.

The highly qualified, experienced and dedicated faculty and the effective and efficient utilization of all the available resources ensures empowerment and quality transformation of the student community. The services rendered by this institution in this regard are of the highest order as testified by the consistent top ranks and grades secured by our students at the University level. The higher ratio of the number of applications to the sanctioned strength illustrates the great demand for the courses offered by this Institution.

Specialized lab facilities with modern and sophisticated equipments/instruments are available in the Science Departments.. This facilitates proper blending of traditional and modern teaching-learning processes. Extension and field outreach programmes are conducted in the College under the guidance of the teachers. Community development projects are undertaken by some departments in the Institution to disseminate scientific knowledge for the betterment of the weaker sections of the society.

Out of the 24 teaching departments, ten departments have been identified as Research Centers. This includes Hindi, Botany, Chemistry, Economics, Psychology, Philosophy, Zoology, Physics, Music and Malayalam. These departments are actively engaged in research activities. The faculty of the Institution are involved in framing and restructuring of the syllabi for the UG and PG programmes in their capacities as Chairman of Board of Studies, Member of Board of Studies, Academic Council, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Arts and Faculty of Commerce, Senate and Syndicate.

A total of 144776 books including old and historic ones are available in the Institution. Further a large collection of e-books is also downloaded in the college library. In order to acquaint the students and faculty with the latest developments in their respective areas, standard journals leading newspapers magazines & periodicals are also subscribed in the Institution. As a part of holistic development

initiatives, the institution offers Legal Literacy Programmes and Counseling Programmes for students. There are 20 clubs functioning in the Institution and the Institution ensures that every student is a member of a club. To develop leadership qualities among students, Class Leaders, Association Secretaries, College Union Members and Club Convenors are chosen from students. They are provided with necessary environment in which they are free to take appropriate decisions. The NSS units functioning in the institution provide ample opportunities for developing the personality of the student through community service. Through NSS activities the students get a sense of involvement in the task of nation building.

Special coaching is offered by the Physical Education Department for various sports and games like kabaddi, cricket, handball, athletics etc. The Institution also has a fitness centre for the physical development of students. Yoga classes are also conducted for ensuring the physical and mental health of the students and teachers in the Institution. The Institution also provides a suitable platform for the students to showcase their talents through various cultural activities like Arts Festival and interdepartmental competitions. The students of the institution actively participate in intercollegiate, inter university, national level competitions. The institution has a very effective PTA which is actively involved in all the developmental and welfare activities of the Institution. The Head of the institution is the Ex- Officio president of the PTA. The administrative power rests with the executive committee which comprises of 17 members including parents and teachers. Many of our alumni are occupying key positions in Government and Private Sector and they provide valuable input for the development of the Institution. The alumni have its representation in the important bodies of the Institution like CDC (College Development Council), IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) etc. They also extend financial support to meritorious students who belong to the socially and economically backward sections of the society. A unique feature of the Institution is the Continuing Education Sub Centre which offers six long term and 311 short term courses which help the students acquire employability skills.

Forty endowment prizes have been instituted by our former faculty members for recognizing the meritorious performance of the students every year. Many scholarships spurned by the Central & State governments like Central sector Scholarship, State Merit Scholarship, Higher education scholarship, ASPIRE scholarship, Indira Gandhi scholarship etc. are given to support the student to pursue their education.

WEAKNESSES:

ICT enabled classrooms in the college is insufficient. Inadequacy of computers and networking facilities is a constraint to support high-end applications like computational physics, chemistry, Tally, SPSS etc. Though individual departments have separate net connectivity, the campus lacks Wi-Fi connectivity. The laboratories available in the college are over a century old and are long due for up-

gradation to meet the latest developments in the field of Science and Technology. Since majority of our students belong to the socioeconomically backward strata, the college is the only source through which the students get access to ICT enabled resources and laboratory facilities.

The college is administratively controlled by the State Government and academically governed by the Kerala University. All academic reforms are incorporated within the purview of the rules and regulations of the Government and the University. There is a huge dearth of administrative support in the college which adversely affects the day to day affairs of the college. The ratio of administrative staff to students is at 1:38. Similarly the ratio of administrative staff to faculty is 1:3. The position is not different with the technical staff also. The lack of technical training required for handling modern and sophisticated equipments also further worsens the situation.

Considering the magnitude of the revision and updation in the curriculum and allied branches of study, the college is not in a position to strengthen and upgrade the library. The same is the case with journals, magazines and e-resources. After the present library is being designated as a Heritage building, proposal for expansions are in a stand still. Reference facility in almost all the streams is also not up to the expected levels.

Facilities available for differently abled students are limited. However as and when required necessary rearrangement of class rooms are made for the convenience of the students despite the fact that it affects the smooth functioning of the department.

As a policy initiative, the department of General Education is consistently enhancing the intake capacity of Higher Secondary streams, which is feeder course for the UG programmes. However, to tap this excess traffic accumulated over the years, commensurate capacity expansion is not taking place in higher education level. The existing programmes assign only a limited space for sensitizing the student community to social issues, creating civic sense, developing life and human skills to make them responsible and accountable citizens. Though the institution possesses immense human resource potential, the existing regulatory framework prevents the institution from taking up consultancy engagements.

Most of the teachers and a substantial number of students are young mothers who have the great responsibility to take care of their children. Lack of a proper creche facility impairs the smooth functioning of the institution.

OPPORTUNITIES:

The institution is finding it extremely difficult to accommodate the ever increasing demand from the major feeder programmes namely HSE, CBSE and ISC. Owing to the lack of policy initiatives at the

higher education level, in this regard, this gap has widened considerably. Hence, this is the right time to tap this potential by offering parallel batches for the existing UG and PG programmes.

In addition to the above mentioned potential for expansion in the conventional programmes, there exists enormous opportunities for introducing innovative and career oriented programmes as per the industry expectations. To augment the higher level fine tuning warranted by the evolving industries, additional skills have to be developed along with the existing curriculum. In this context there is ample scope for introducing more skill based, short term programmes and for strengthening existing programmes.

Some of the departments in the college have already established collaborations with National and State level agencies and Institutes. There is ample scope for establishing new collaborations with many reputed National as well as International institutions which will result in the creation of Intellectual Property Rights (IPR). If this environment can be fostered with a positive spirit it can result in a win-win situation for the institution and the collaborators.

The resources of the institution can be utilised for consultancy services, and the revenue generated through this can be utilised for developmental activities in the college. With sufficient infrastructure investment in this area, the multi-disciplinary expertise available in the college can be effectively utilised for consultancy. The institution has immense scope for disseminating the knowledge related to various disciplines for addressing the needs of the society, thereby equipping the students to face social realities. An extension cell can be formulated and students can be trained as extension agents for bringing about desirable changes in the community.

The college has high potential for multi-disciplinary research activities as there are 24 teaching departments functioning in the college. The introduction of New Generation/ Vocational courses, as already envisaged, will offer high potential for upgrading academic research to applied research, which will in due course result in the creation of IPR .(Intellectual Property Right). Life- long learning centres can be established in all departments to cater to the requirements of stakeholders by designing appropriate programmes incorporating latest developments and emerging trends in the respective disciplines.

THREATS:

Undue emphasis given by the society to professions like medicine and engineering has adversely affected the quality of input in Arts & Science streams. The situation is further worsened by engineering graduates opting for non-engineering jobs in the Government and Private sectors, which in turn affects the employment opportunities of students of Arts and Science colleges. This indirectly affects their self-esteem and morale.

Online courses and establishment of foreign universities pose a great threat to the institution. Short-term job oriented courses offered by some specialised agencies are also a threat for the three year Degree programmes. As per the existing regulations of the University of Kerala, the real-time updation of the UG and PG curriculum is not possible, which poses a threat to attract the placement agencies to the college.

Being a Government institution, the college has to strictly adhere to the norms specified by the State Government. With the level of flexibility enjoyed by the autonomous/ research/ technological/ scientific institutions, they are reluctant to sign MOUs with this institutions, owing to the rigidity of the system. This system will be further worsened with the entry of foreign universities and corporate institutions. Insufficient teaching faculty along with trained and skilled technical staff poses a great threat to the institution to excel. This in turn grossly affects the up gradation plans of the laboratories which are already overdue for modernisation.

The mental health of the students needs to be addressed as it would be the greatest hindrance in the development of any student. The changes in the social fabric (nuclear families), career concerns, parental pressures, peer pressure, stress related issues etc adversely affect the mental health of students which indirectly affects their performance levels. The teachers today are overburdened with administrative and clerical work with the introduction of semesterisation and this has in turn deprived them of the quality time they had earlier, to maintain personal rapport with students. In the present curriculum, the effective utilization of cyberspace for academic advantages is in its infant stage. A lot of maturity is required on the part of the user to safeguard themselves from the temptations and exploitations of cyberspace. Though students get access to cyberspace through sophisticated electronic gadgets, an effective mechanism of academic interventions for ensuring creative usage of cyberspace is lacking in the institution.
